### About the Meet

---

- ▶ The inaugural Home Depot Track & Field Invitational is the first event to be held at The Home Depot Center, a 125-acre, \$150 million project of the Anschutz Entertainment Group (AEG).
  - The meet is produced by AEG Events under the direction of Bill Peterson, Senior Vice President, AEG and Track & Field Coordinator Russell Silvers.
  - The Meet Director is Rich Perelman, also the meet director for UCLA home meets and three Pac-10 Championships meets. The Elite Athlete Coordinator is Bruce Tenen.
- ▶ The meet is the fourth outdoor meet in the USA Track & Field Golden Spike Tour series and the first Golden Spike meet to ever be held in the Southern California area. Los Angeles is an appropriate site: more world records (137) have been set here than in any other U.S. city, with New York (60) and Philadelphia (40) a distant second and third. Los Angeles ranks fourth worldwide among world-record setting cities, with London (195), Moscow (146) and Paris (141) ahead.
- ▶ The track & field facility at The Home Depot Center houses an Italian-designed, Canadian-made Mondo Super-X nine-lane track with full field-event facilities inside. There are 2,000 permanent seats and for the Invitational, 8,094 temporary seats provided by Brown United for a seating capacity of 10,094. The site will hold 20,050 for the 2006 IAAF World Cup.
- ▶ Future track & field events slated for The Home Depot Center include bids for the 2004 U.S. National Junior Championships, 2005 U.S. National Championships and the 2005-06-07 NCAA Division I Track & Field Championships (a meet not held in the L.A. area since 1955!).

### Event information

---

- ▶ The program includes 21 events (4 field, 17 track) plus an opening program featuring Olympians from 1932 (when Los Angeles hosted the Games for the first time) through 2000.
- ▶ Based on field sizes as of May 30, the total number of participants is projected at 213 (105 elite, 20 Paralympic athletes plus 32 promotional and 56 youth in the relays).
- ▶ A prize purse of \$103,500 is offered for the meet, in two levels depending on the event:
  - \$10,000 for six Premiere events: \$5,000-2,500-1,250-750-500 for the men's and women's 100 meters, men's and women's 1,500 meters, men's shot put and women's pole vault.
  - \$7,250 for six Standard events: \$3,000-2,000-1,000-750-500 for the men's and women's 400 meters, men's 110-meter and women's 100-meter Hurdles, men's long jump and women's discus.
  - No prize purse for the Olympic Development events in the men's and women's 3,000 meters.
- ▶ The fields in the 12 prize-money events include 37 Olympians from nine nations (Bahamas, Cayman Islands, Great Britain, Japan, Mexico, Nigeria, Saudi Arabia, Slovenia, USA) and 12 gold medalists.
- ▶ Drug testing on 12 athletes selected at random will be done by the U.S. Anti-Doping Agency. The lead agent is Thad Starr.

### Officials and Rules

---

Officials are provided by the Southern California Association of USA Track & Field. Starters are Alan Amundsen and Saul Pacheco; the meet referee is Bob Baker.

The meet will be run under USA Track & Field rules. In the running events, a second false start will disqualify competitors. In the long jump, shot and discus, all competitors will receive six attempts, but the order for the last three attempts will be in reverse order of standing after three rounds.

### *Opening Ceremonies*

---

A parade of Olympians will begin the festivities at noon, celebrating the great history of Los Angeles in track & field as well as the Home Depot Center's designation as a U.S. Olympic Training Site. The participants, as of May 30, include:

### *Sponsors*

The Home Depot is the title sponsor of the meet, with ADT security systems and LG mobile phones as associate sponsors. The Home Depot is an enthusiastic supporter of the Olympic Job Opportunities Program (OJOP) and seven athletes competing in the meet are also staff members of The Home Depot: long sprinter Jerome Davis, middle distance runner Jason Pyrah, hurdlers Mark Crear and Melissa Morrison, long jumper Roland McGhee, shot putter (and 2003 world leader) Kevin Toth and discus thrower Aretha Hill.

The Golden Spike Tour series is sponsored by Verizon and Visa.

### *Television*

---

The meet will be televised live on ESPN2 from 12:30 to 2:00 p.m. Pacific time. The producer is Chris Lincoln; the announcing team includes play-by-play lead Larry Rawson, analyst Carol Lewis and on-field reporter and U.S. Track & Field Hall of Fame high jumper Dwight Stones.

*The Home Depot Center*

---

This remarkable facility, constructed on 125 acres on the campus of California State University, Dominguez Hills, includes a 27,000-seat soccer stadium (home to the L.A. Galaxy), an 8,000-seat tennis center (expandable to 13,000 seats), the track facility, a beach volleyball facility and the only indoor velodrome in the United States, now under construction. It cost \$150 million to build with construction taking only 15 months from groundbreaking in late February 2002 to its opening on June 1, 2003.
