

Widely regarded as the greatest baseball announcer of all-time, Vin Scully has been with the Dodgers since its days in Brooklyn. The upcoming season will be Vin's 67th and final season with the Dodgers, the longest time any broadcaster has been with a single team in professional sports history.

Tonight, he is being honored as the first-ever recipient of the L.A. Sports Council's *Lifetime Achievement Award*.


"I can't think of a person more deserving of this recognition," said Sports Council President David Simon. "Even more remarkable than his longevity is the consistently high quality and integrity his announcing has represented over the years."

For generations of Southern California baseball fans, Scully's dulcet voice, lyrically descriptive style, and signature introduction to Dodger games - "It's time for Dodger baseball!" - have provided the soundtrack of summer.

During his legendary career he has been behind the microphone for many of the game's most iconic moments, including 25 World Series, three perfect games, 19 no-hitters and Dodger Kirk Gibson's famous walk-off home run in the 1988 World Series.

In 1982, Scully was inducted into the broadcaster's wing of the National Baseball Hall of Fame.







Rousey Defeats Zingano in 14 Seconds – In the guickest title fight in UFC history, Ronda Rousey used an armbar to defeat Cat Zingano in a mere 14 seconds. In doing so Rousey improved to 11-0 in her UFC career and retained her bantamweight championship, at Staples Center (February 28).

Clippers Defeat San Antonio, 4-3, in NBA **Playoffs** – Chris Paul, playing on an injured hamstring, banked in a shot over Tim Duncan with one second to go to lift the Clippers over the defending NBA champion Spurs, 111-109, in a dramatic Game 7 at Staples Center (May 2).

American Pharoah Wins Triple Crown and Breeders' Cup Classic - Santa Anita-based American Pharoah, who trained at the legendary track under Bob Baffert, won the Belmont Stakes to become one of only 12 horses to win racing's Triple Crown (Kentucky Derby, Preakness, Belmont Stakes) and the first since 1978. He then cemented his place in thoroughbred racing history by winning the Breeders' Cup Classic at Keeneland, Kentucky, by 6 ½ lengths, becoming the first horse to complete a "Grand Slam" by winning all four major races (June 6 and October 31).

Clippers Re-Sign DeAndre Jordan - In one of the most dramatic free agent signings of recent years, center DeAndre Jordan signed a four-year contract with the Clippers after verbally committing to the Dallas Mavericks (July 9).

Los Angeles Hosts 2015 Special Olympics **World Games** – Returning to the United States for the first time since 1999, the guadrennial World Games featured the largest gathering of nations in Los Angeles history: 6,163 athletes and 2,651 coaches and officials from 164 countries. The Games produced a memorable display of sports and social action for athletes, coaches, and a World Games-record 247,247 spectators in Los Angeles as well as a worldwide television audience (July 25-August 2).

Los Angeles Chosen as U.S. Candidate City for the 2024 Olympics – The United States Olympic Committee selected Los Angeles as its official candidate for the 2024 Olympic and Paralympic Games, marking the first time since 1977 that the USOC chose Los Angeles for the honor and launching the city on a twoyear international campaign. The International Olympic Committee will vote to elect the 2024 host city from among L.A., Paris, Rome and Budapest in September of 2017 (September 1).

Mike Trout's Sensational Catch – After being named All-Star Game Most Valuable Player for the second straight year, Angels outfielder Mike Trout validated that honor with an astonishing, over-thecenterfield wall catch. The top half of Trout's body was above the wall as he robbed Seattle's Jesus Montero of a three-run home run, at Angel Stadium (September 26).

Rose Bowl Hosts Thrilling CONCACAF Cup Final – With a berth in the eight-team 2017 FIFA

Confederations Cup on the line, Mexico scored with two minutes left in extra time to record a 3-2 victory over the United States before a capacity crowd of 93,723 at the Rose Bowl (October 10).

Greinke and Kershaw: Most Dominating Pitching Teammates in 50 Years - The Dodgers' Zack Greinke and Clayton Kershaw proved to be the most potent pair of starting pitchers on the same team in more than 50 years. Between them they led the majors in earned run average (Greinke) and strikeouts and innings pitched (Kershaw) and had combined statistics not seen in a team's top two starters since Sandy Koufax and Don Drysdale in 1964. The two finished second and third in the National League Cy Young voting (November 18).

Dave Roberts Hired as Dodger Manager -Former Dodger outfielder Dave Roberts was named as the first minority manager in Los Angeles Dodger history and the 10th overall since the club's move to Los Angeles in 1958 (November 23).

USC Beats UCLA to Win Pac-12 South -Cody Kessler threw two touchdown passes and ran for another score as the Trojans defeated the Bruins at the Coliseum, 40-21, to advance to the Pac-12 Championship Game for the first time in the game's five-year history (November 28).

Kobe Bryant Announces His Retirement – Laker great Kobe Bryant, saying, "This season is all I have left to give," announced he will retire at the end of the current season, having won five NBA titles and establishing himself as one of the best ever to play the game of basketball (November 29).

UCLA Upsets Kentucky in Basketball - The Bruins took the lead in the opening minutes and never relinguished it, beating the heavily favored and #1-ranked Wildcats, 87-77, at Pauley Pavilion. It was the 11th time UCLA has defeated a top-ranked team and the first since 2003 (December 3).

Local Sports Icons Denman and Dwyre Retire

– Two long-time fixtures on the local sports scene retired within a week of each other: Bill Dwyre, after 34 years with the Los Angeles Times as columnist and former sports editor (November 25) and Trevor Denman, the legendary announcer, after 33 years of calling races at Santa Anita (December 4).

Three NFL Teams Vie to Move to Los Angeles –

The Chargers, Raiders and Rams declared their formal interest in moving to Los Angeles by sponsoring privately financed – and competing – stadium projects in Carson and Inglewood. It's the first time in the NFL's 20-year absence that team owners, rather than non-owners, have proposed to build a new football stadium. A decision by the NFL was pending at the end of 2015 (Various dates).

Blake Griffin further solidified himself as one of the NBA's brightest and most popular stars in 2015. He led the Clippers in scoring during the regular season with 21.9 points per game, which ranked eighth in the league, and was chosen by NBA fans worldwide as a starting forward for the Western Conference in the NBA All-Star Game (though he was unable to participate due to injury).

His game reached new heights in the first round of the NBA playoffs, where his exceptional play led the Clippers to victory over the San Antonio Spurs in seven games.

Griffin was the dominant player in that series, averaging 24 points and 13 rebounds per game (including a triple-double in the series clincher) to knock off the defending champions.

In the second round against Houston, Griffin again posted remarkable stats, although the Clippers fell to the Rockets in seven games.

Overall, in 14 playoff games in 2015, the five-time All-Star averaged 25.5 points, 12.7 rebounds and 6.1 assists.

Griffin is the third Clippers player to win the Sportsman award, joining 2013 honoree Chris Paul and 2006 recipient Elton Brand.

SPORTSWOMEN OF THE YEAR



U.S. WOMEN'S NATIONAL SOCCER TEAM

Four years after a heartbreaking loss to Japan in the FIFA Women's World Cup final, team captain Carli Lloyd and her U.S. teammates made absolutely sure there would be no repeat in the rematch.

In the July 7 championship game, Lloyd scored a hat trick in the first 16 minutes as the Americans won, 5-2, in Vancouver, Canada, for their first World Cup title since 1999.

More than 25 million viewers saw the final, making it the most-watched soccer match in U.S. television history.

The Stars and Stripes' roster included a significant Southern California presence, and the team often conducted training camps at the StubHub Center in Carson.

Among those team members with ties to the region are Shannon Boxx (Redondo Beach), Whitney Engen (Rolling Hills Estates), Lauren Holiday (UCLA), Sydney Leroux (UCLA), Alex Morgan (Diamond Bar), Christen Press (Palos Verdes Estates) and Amy Rodriguez (Lake Forest/USC).

In addition, U.S. head coach Jill Ellis was the long-time head coach at UCLA, running the women's soccer program for 12 years.

The triumphant team was honored with its own ticker tape parade in New York City - the first for a women's sports team.

Patrick McClenahan ran the remarkably successful 2015 Special Olympics World Games, held in Los Angeles last summer. After leading the winning international bid campaign to bring the event here, he accepted the role of President and CEO. McClenahan built a team of 428 employees and raised more than \$100 million in cash and in-kind to put on the largest sports and humanitarian event held anywhere in the world in 2015.

More than 6,000 athletes from 164 countries - the largest gathering of nations for any event in the city's history - competed in 25 sports competitions over nine days.

A longtime media executive, McClenahan also negotiated the firstever World Games global broadcast agreement with ESPN, which included live coverage of the spectacular Opening Ceremony at the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum, attended by First Lady Michelle Obama.

McClenahan made it the Games' mission to create awareness that leads to acceptance and inclusion of people with intellectual disabilities. Last summer the fulfillment of that mission was on display for all of Los Angeles and the world to see.

Patrick and his wife, Karren, are the proud parents of Eric and Kelly. Kelly has Cerebral Palsy and is a key inspiration in Patrick's desire to serve those with special needs.

COACH OF THE YEAR



During the 2015 season, Clay Helton succeeded in keeping the USC football team together during what can only be described as an extremely challenging set of off-field circumstances.


After head coach Steve Sarkisian took a leave of absence, and was subsequently fired mid-season, the Trojans football program was in disarray.

Helton, who began the year as USC's offensive coordinator, was named interim head coach, charged with the task of lifting the program from one of its lowest points in recent memory.

Under his leadership, the Trojans won four straight conference games and defeated UCLA to win the Pac-12 South and advance to the conference championship game for the first time in the game's five-year history.

On November 30, with the unanimous support of the players, Helton completed the rare transition in college football from interim to permanent head coach, signing a multi-year agreement.

Athletic Director Pat Haden called Helton "a man with unquestioned integrity... a leader of young men who brings high character, stability, toughness and resiliency to our program."


